April 17, 1982 motioned a new era beginning for Canadians with disabilities, as Canada's new Constitution came into force. In the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, Canada made a constitutional commitment in Section 15 to equality before and under the law for those living with disabilities.

(Section 15 came into force in 1985).

Canada's constitution was the first to include equality rights protection of people with disabilities.



Celebrating 30 Years

2012 has been a stellar year for the Ottawa Rotary Home as it celebrates 30 years of service to Ottawa and surrounding areas. I was honoured to be invited to attend a session at the Senate of Canada marking another 30th milestone hosted by Senator David Smith on April 24th, recognizing the passing of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms in 1982. Several of us including Donna Thomson, a member of our Rotary Home family, were in attendance representing individuals and agencies providing service and advocacy for people with disabilities. A particular focus of the presentation by Senator Smith was his work to have persons with mental or physical disabilities granted equality before the law. Section 15, Paragraph 1 of the Charter states: *Every individual is equal before and under the law and has the right to the equal protection and equal benefit of the law without discrimination and, in particular, without discrimination based on race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, sex, age or mental or physical disability.* It may be surprising to us today that the inclusion of persons with a disability in a statement of inherent rights and freedoms took some intense effort on the part of a small group of Canadians, led by Senator Smith as Deputy House Leader in the Pierre Trudeau Government.

EMERGENCY CONTACTS: Upon admission please provide us with emergency contact information for someone who is able to take your child into their care in the event that we need to discharge your child and/or young adult due to illness or emergency closure.

TRANSPORTATION: It is the responsibility of the parent and/or caregiver to arrange for any transportation arrangements required during visits.

MEDICATIONS: All medications require a pharmacy label. Staff cannot legally dispense medication from an unlabeled bottle or container with a hand written label. Vitamins, herbal compounds and over-the-counter medications must be in their original container with a manufacturer's label. Please ensure that the expiration date has not passed with medications not used regularly.

PERSONAL BELONGINGS AND SUPPLIES: Please ensure all equipment and supplies needed for the duration of the visit are provided. Labeling clothing items and belongings prior to the visit and sending only what will be required will make the admission process more efficient. The Rotary Home has a Lost and Found in the event any items are misplaced.

VISITORS: Guests are welcome at the Rotary Home during respite visits. Please inform staff of any visitors at admission by providing their full name and if this person has permission to take your child/young adult out of the home. All visitors will be asked to provide photo identification to staff before visit.

ADMISSIONS AND DISCHARGES: Sunday, Monday or Friday. Admission are between 3:00 pm and 4:00 pm and discharges are between 1:00 pm and 2:00 pm. Admits and discharges are not permitted mid-week. It is important to be on time as programs are based on these time periods.

CARE PLANS: Please review the care plan upon admission and update as needed.
